- E-Cigs Breed More Smokers Than They Stop: While the device helps some adults quit the habit for good, research suggests nicotine vaping leads to many more tobacco users. Scientists estimate that about 2,070 cigarette-smoking adults in America quit in 2015 with the help of the electronic devices. However—and perhaps more alarming—the model estimated that, at the same time, an additional 168,000 adolescents and young adults who had never smoked cigarettes began smoking and eventually became daily cigarette smokers after first using e-cigarettes.
