This morning (5/30/18) the American Cancer Society released a new colorectal cancer screening guideline, published in CA: A Cancer Journal for Clinicians, recommending that adults at average risk for colorectal cancer start regular screening at age 45. The guideline was changed, based in part, on new data showing rates of colorectal cancer are increasing in younger populations. Find out more here: cancer.org/coloncancer. More Young Adults Getting, Dying From Colon Cancer WEBINAR: The National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable (NCCRT) will host a webinar on Tuesday, June 19th at 3:00pm ET for an NCCRT webinar to introduce a new resource: Risk Assessment and Screening Toolkit to Detect Familial, Hereditary and Early Onset CRC. The toolkit seeks to enable primary care clinicians to implement a structured family history collection system to identify individuals at increased or high risk of CRC and develop a management strategy for those individuals, and facilitate timely diagnostic evaluation of patients with signs/symptoms of early onset CRC. 	 JOURNAL ARTICLE: on <u>Using Community Engagement and Navigators to Increase Colon Cancer Screening and Patient Outcomes</u>. Devereux et al. <i>Health Promotion Practice</i>. February 9, 2018. During the 16 months of delivery screening, patient navigators integrated into gastroenterology clinics met all goals, which included enrolling an ethnically diverse group of participants through in-reach and community outreach, facilitating screening completions for 61% of patients identified as needing screening, obtaining satisfaction ratings from 89% of participants, and improved bowel prep quality. JOURNAL ARTICLE: A new journal article appeared in <i>Clinical Colorectal Cancer</i>, entitled, <u>Addressing Racial Disparity in Colorectal Cancer Screening With CT Colonography: Experience in an African-American Cohort</u>. Data	 Annual Report to the Nation on the Status of Cancer was released on May 22, 2018. According to the report: Overall cancer death rates continue to decrease in men, women, and children for all major racial and ethnic groups; Overall cancer incidence rates, or rates of new cancers, have decreased in men and remained stable in women; Overall prostate cancer incidence rates declined. Incidence of distant disease increased, and after decades of decline, prostate cancer mortality leveled off. Read key findings and associated charts, graphs, and social media tools.
