

8 New <u>Comprehensive</u> Smoke-free Laws in the Past Year

Strength of Smoke-free Ordinances



As of April 1, 2019, 35.5% of Kentuckians are protected by smoke-free laws covering all indoor workplaces and public places.*







Types of Smoke-free Workplace Laws

COMPREHENSIVE

- Covers all workplaces and enclosed public places
- Protects all workers from exposure to secondhand smoke. No one is left out.
- Effective; biggest gains in population health


PARTIAL

- Covers only some enclosed public places
- Exempts certain businesses & specific communities
- Leaves some workers and patrons unprotected from exposure to secondhand smoke
- Creates an uneven playing field for businesses and the potential for legal challenges






The KCSP Policy Advocacy Model







The E-Cigarette Epidemic








The Mod-Pods or 'Juul' Epidemic

2019 Kentucky General Assembly

□ HB 11 Tobacco-free Schools

- Exempts non-student adults on field trips when not in the presence of students
- □ Allows local school districts to opt out (sunsets June 30 2023)
- □ BUT....allows local school districts to adopt more strict policy (e.g., 24/7 best practice TF policy)

□ SB 249 Tobacco 21

□ SB 249 and other amendments to raise the minimum legal age of sale of tobacco products to age 21 failed, despite intense lobbying from Altria.
