Increasing funding to for KY Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program - Overall Policy Priority

- Proposed used of funding to support evidence-based interventions:
 - o Fund massive media campaigns -we know media works at driving people to the quit line.
 - Enhance services to the quit line -we know people who enroll in the quit line and stay in the quit line are we're likely to quit up to 50% quit rate.
 - o Expand nicotine replacement therapy access through quit line.
 - Support Local Health Departments, fund a health educator in every health department, to address the leading causes of death and disability at the local level.
 - Additional staff for targeted community outreach in most impacted populations/communities
 - Expand existing contracts.

T-21 Enforcement - Strengthen impact of Tobacco 21 (T21) law

- Require all tobacco retail businesses to obtain licenses, provide for and fund specific enforcement measures and establish a meaningful penalty structure for underage sales violations.
- Enforcement equity is an interesting conversation and speaks to the importance of really getting buy-in from communities about policy.
- The contraband argument is a popular industry red herring because it turns the attention to 'counterfeit' cigarettes (protecting industry profits) instead of the fact that none of these products should be accessible by youth and all of them are deadly.
- Shyanika Rose, UK researcher is doing several retail audit studies and starting with the SYNAR list we are adding many retailers who are not those inspection lists without TRL.
- Proposed legislation in KYGA 2023 Youth Access to Tobacco/Nicotine Products: (Both bills were strongly opposed by partner health organizations.)
 - o <u>HB 310</u> to penalize clerks for underage tobacco/nicotine product sales
 - o HB 370 to penalize youth for purchase, use of possession of tobacco/nicotine products

JUUL Settlement Funds

Allocate the \$14 million the state stands to receive in JUUL settlement funds to the state's
tobacco prevention and cessation program and ensure that funding is spent according to the
Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Best Practices for Comprehensive Tobacco Control

Tobacco Local Control – Smoke-free

BREATHE continues to defend existing smoke-free laws from exemptions -- usually cigar bars or gaming facilities. Campbellsville City Council Campbell county's smoke-free ordinance has been in effect since 2009, now has a proposed amendment, with a first reading, to allow indoor smoking rooms in establishments that sell alcohol. There will be a second reading on December 18th -- would love for everyone to be part of reaching out to policy makers talking to residents about the impact on population health/community health. KY Chamber 2024 Legislative Agenda - **Supports efforts to reduce smoking rate** -The Chamber supports a range of policy proposals to reduce smoking including removing smokers as a protected class, increasing the amount of funding for the state's Tobacco Prevention and Cessation Program, increasing taxes on cigarettes and e- cigarettes, enacting a statewide smoke-free law, and giving local governments more leeway to regulate the use, display, sale or distribution of tobacco or vapor products. Such policies should be implemented without increasing "purchase, use, or possession" penalties for youth, which are ineffective and raise the likelihood of youth becoming involved with the criminal justice system.

All Payers Claim Database (APCD)

- Proposed legislation during KYGA 2023 -All-Payer Claims Database (APCD), <u>SB38</u>
- A Kentucky APCD could serve as a repository of all healthcare claims that can provide insight
 into the cost and quality of care and identify health disparities across demographics. With data
 public and private payers that provides an apples-to-apples comparison across health systems,

- regions and demographics, policymakers and providers can make more informed decisions and target interventions to improve health outcomes and reduce healthcare waste.
- A claims database could be integrated with KY Health Information Exchange (KHIE) or could be housed within a university
- Myth: There is a burden or cost on hospitals. Fact: Insurers would provide claims data that has already been paid. Individual doctor's offices do not have to do anything.

Prior Authorization

- Representative Kim Moser will move her prior authorization bill again with some changes

Advancing Lives for Pregnancy and Healthy Alternatives (ALPHA) Act "momnibus"

- (Sen. Westerfield) BR-8 (2024) and BR 8 Summary lengthen and maintain eligibility for all public assistance. The draft bill a wide range of issues including special enrollment and maternity coverage, breastfeeding and lactation coverage, basic health plan, child care, child and dependent care tax credit, housing, education, and food insecurity.

Basic Health Plan and Network Adequacy

- The Kentucky Department for Medicaid Services (DMS) is developing a <u>Basic Health Program</u>
 (BHP) in accordance with 42 CFR Part 600. This means adults with Medicaid have access to
 comprehensive hearing, vision and dental services. This will increase the number of people
 seeking benefit and creates a need to have more providers in the network

Non-Emergency Medical Transportation (NEMT)

- Based on proposed legislation during KYGA 2023 Title 907 | Chapter 003 | Regulation 066REG
- Transportation is consistently reported as the number one barrier to healthcare (not cost due to expanded Medicaid.). Transportation is a covered benefit in Medicaid, but it is almost not utilized at all, and when it is utilized, it is not easy. Proposed legislation will work to make the service more functional.

KY Food Action Network 2024 Policy Priorities

• Support local agriculture and food systems and feed more hungry Kentuckians by establishing the Healthy Farm and Food Innovation Fund (HFFIF). Last year, House Bill 384 (HB 384) aimed to create a structured state fund capable of receiving state, federal, and private philanthropy funds to provide opportunities for farmers and support programs such as Kentucky Double Dollars, Farms to Food Banks, and Fresh RX for MOMs—and pave the way for additional new efforts.

- Food as Medicine There is growing evidence for food as medicine initiatives. It is important we are able to draw on existing state and federal resources to help fund food as medicine initiatives. Some Food as Medicine policy ideas KFAN members are exploring, include:
 - Utilize a <u>Medicaid 1115 waiver</u> to use federal Medicaid funds to pay the direct costs of nonmedical services for medically-tailored meals and housing.
 - Utilize Medicaid Flexible Services help cover the cost of Community Supported Agriculture
 - o <u>Utilize Medicaid</u> and other health programs to directly-certify children for free school meals.
 - Ensure Kentucky incentivizes participation in food is medicine initiatives in the Medicaid program, such as Food Prescription programs, through MCO contracts.

Promote Updated USPSTF Screening Guidelines and State Resource

- Fund and develop communication campaign to promote USPSTF Screening Guideline to start colorectal screenings beginning at age 45.
- Promote KWCSP FREE Breast and Cervical Cancer Screenings screening program
