Kentucky Lung Cancer Screening Learning Collaborative *The Crucial Role of Primary Care in Lung Cancer Screening* January 14, 2026

Summary of the session

The session focused on improving lung cancer screening referral and uptake across Kentucky through primary care engagement. Key themes included workflow integration, navigation, reducing provider burden, improving patient awareness, and the importance of strong data use to motivate systems and clinicians.

Discussion Highlights:

- Dr. Anthony Weaver emphasized the urgency of increasing screening rates, drawing comparisons to screening practices for other cancers. He highlighted the high mortality of lung cancer in Kentucky and argued that low-dose CT should replace chest X-rays as the baseline imaging tool for smokers.
- Tiffany Clark described the centralized lung cancer screening program at Owensboro Health, which streamlines referrals and reduces provider burden. Her team provides education, EMR optimization, and centralized care coordination to ensure seamless screening processes.
- Dr. Jane Strader shared the decentralized approach at King's Daughters Medical Center, including the use of Epic workflows, health maintenance tools, and nurse-driven prompts. She noted challenges with follow-up and the need for enhanced navigation resources.
- Deanna Wigginton provided insight into her dual role as both clinician and navigator. She performs outreach to primary care practices, reviews all screening results, navigates incidental findings, coordinates specialty referrals, and ensures patients remain connected throughout the screening continuum.
- Dr. Michael Gieske highlighted the power of data to drive improvement. His program produces regular reports, recognizes high-performing sites, and shows significant progress in detecting more cancers at early stages and increasing annual adherence.

Key Themes Discussed

- Limited provider time and patient awareness are major barriers.
- Navigation is essential but often understaffed.
- Strong relationships between primary care, navigators, and specialists improve adherence.
- EMR optimization can reduce errors and streamline referrals.

- Public awareness and patient stories help reduce stigma.
- Healthy competition and transparency improve provider engagement.
- HEDIS-Related Discussion: Panelists discussed the upcoming HEDIS measure on smoking documentation and cessation counseling. While lung cancer screening was removed from the new measure, improved smoking documentation will support screening workflows.
- Opportunities for Improvement
 - More centralized navigation support.
 - Increased outreach and education for providers.
 - Better integration of incidental findings into navigation workflows.
 - Continued use of performance data to encourage uptake.
